Unstuffed Peppers

From: Campbell's Kitchen Prep: 10 minutes Cook: 25 minutes

Serves: 4

If you love the flavor of stuffed peppers, but don't want all the fuss, try this easy skillet dish that features great taste and less work...what could be better?

Ingredients:

- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 1/2 pound ground turkey
- 1 medium onion, chopped (about 1/2 cup)
- 1/2 teaspoon dried basil leaves, crushed
